“Ek kyk op na die berge, waarvandaan sal daar vir my hulp kom?” ’n Baie relevante en realistiese vraag wanneer jy in die skoene van ’n graad agt-leerling staan. Net soos wat hierdie vraag dikwels in die skoolgange weergalm, wemel dit in ’n nuweling se kop sodra hy die eerste dag by die Roos instap: Die begin van die proses om ’n ware Paul Rooser, ’n heer en ’n *gentleman*, te word.

’n Tradisie wat alle Paul Roosers ken. ’n Tradisie wat elkeen van ons soos broers aan mekaar verbind. Soos bloed-broers: Oriënteringsweek.

Die angs, die afwagting, die opwindung... ’n Warrelwind van emosies wat jou ’n bietjie deur die blare laat voel wanneer jy by die hekke instap, om die sirkel versamel met Japie Krige se figuur voor jou. Jou hoofseun, Daniel Whitehead, sê jy mag nie die matrieks in die oë kyk nie, onderhoofseuns lees Psalm 121 en open met gebed. Dan groet Daniel die ouers en verseker hulle dat hul seuns in die beste hande is en ná hierdie week jong *gentlemen* sal wees.

Die program skop af met onmenslik baie administrasie: Handboeke, registerklasse, name, ensovoorts. Chaos. Beheerde chaos. En daarna, ’n onvergeetlike skooltoer — die hoogtepunt van die dag! In die snikhete Stellenbosch-hitte

laat jou baadjietrots die sweet tap. Verby die Japie in die hoofgebou in. Skoene weergalm in die gange saam met die geskiedenis wat aanhou lewe in die argief. Blootstelling aan ons topklasfasiliteite, die “High Performance Centre”, Antoine Rupert-swembad, opgegradeerde skeinatklasse, die topklas- binnemuurse krieketsentrum met die “oval” buite in die skaduwee van die majestueuse berg. Moenie bekommer nie, hulle het gees wat gewoonlik op die Markötter-sportvelde heers, eerstehands beleef. Saam met die sweet, die rym-pies, die skoollied en die Jolla Bolla word hulle nie net geleer van die skool se geskiedenis, waardes en tradisies nie, iets begin vorm aanneem ... ’n Broederskap. ’n Spesiale band.

Tydens die oriënteringsweek word die nuweling meer oor die skoolgeskiedenis geleer. Hoe dinge hier gedoen word en wat dit beteken om ’n ware heer te wees. Een van die mooiste gebeurtenisse is die verduideliking van ons wapen: die Stellenbosch-pieke. Ons stap ’n roete tot by die eerste kruis waar Psalm 121 weereens voorgelees word. Dit is die eerste keer dat die nuweling die trots wat met die dra van die maroen baadjie gepaardgaan, beleef.

die vraag wat aan die begin van die uitdagende week word uiteindelik beantwoord: “My hulp kom van die Here wat hemel en aarde gemaak het.”

Die geluid van opgewonde stemme weerklink in die gange wanneer elke nuwe Paul Rooser sy PRG-das en -hoed ontvang. Vir dekades lank is die oriënteringsweek ’n geleentheid vir ’n nuweling om te leer hoe om ’n heer te wees, dames te hanteer, die tradisies van die skool behoue te laat bly, die baadjie trots te dra en ’n gevoel van samehorigheid en broederskap te skep. En selfs na soveel dekades is elke Paul Rooser net so trots om die baadjie te dra en PRG tot nog hoër hoogtes te bring.

Ná 160 jaar bloei elke Paul Rooser steeds dieselfde bloed. Maroen.

My partner and I have decided to settle in Knysna. We both love the calm inland waters and the surrounding forests in the wider Knysna area. We plan on doing a lot of stand-up paddling and hiking. There are also fantastic cycling trails close to our house.

I plan to stay busy with meaningful things. I want to volunteer at the Knysna Animal Welfare (KAWS) charity shop, help out at the Knysna Public Library, read stories to the elderly in the many retirement villages and who knows... maybe teach Afrikaans and English in an ad-hoc capacity.

What originally inspired Ma'am to come to Paul Roos?

I studied Library and Information Management, majoring in Afrikaans and English at Stellenbosch University. I even did my practical teaching at Paul Roos in the mid-eighties, but never followed a teaching career as a school librarian or language teacher. I spent about 30 years doing information and knowledge project management in the financial, mining, oil and gas industries. I moved to Stellenbosch from Johannesburg 7 years ago in a corporate position. When the opportunity presented itself to be a part of the exciting proj-



ect of setting up a new Paul Roos Media Centre, I knew it was something I wanted to be a part of. It felt like I had come full circle and leaving the corporate world for Paul Roos, doing this, was almost prophetic.

Do you have any funny or memorable stories from your time at PRG?

Oh my gosh – there have been a few. I think I have heard every possible excuse why media tasks could not be completed. A few Grade 9 boys once stole a stack of the Media Centre bookmarks. I just hope they put them to good use. The most fun we had in class was when I would catch someone chewing gum and the entire class chanting for the boy to put it in his hair. I was always surprised how willing they were to comply. I am sure the entertainment factor outweighed the punishment!

What will you remember about PRG?

I have had the privilege of getting to know some of the most amazing young minds. Each of the boys I have met and walked a short path with will stay with me for a long time and I will be interested to know where they are and what they are up to long after they leave PRG.

What will you miss most about PRG?

I most definitely had the best 'office' in the whole of PRG and for that I am truly grateful. I will miss spending my days in this beautiful space chatting to my 'tribe' during breaks.

Do you have any words of wisdom for a Paul Rooser?

I climbed [Kilimanjaro] in 2013 to help raise funds for

the SPCA. We had to start our summit attempt after midnight. By sunrise we could see the summit, but still had about 3 hours of tough walking ahead of us. I was very cold and tired and struggled to breathe due to the altitude. I sat on a rock catching my breath and realised the sunrise over Africa was SO beautiful and I was sitting on top of our continent with the clouds and the sun below me. Even though I hadn't reached the summit yet (we summited at

08h30 that morning), what I got to see at that point made it all worthwhile. I guess the lesson is, that regardless of whether you reach your goal, please make sure you stop and enjoy the journey getting there.

Ma'am, with your departure, the Roos has lost one of its flowers. Your absence is felt in the hearts of all the boys you've had an impact on over the years, and your contributions to the PRG reading culture will always be remembered. We thank you for your hard work, and wish you well for the future.

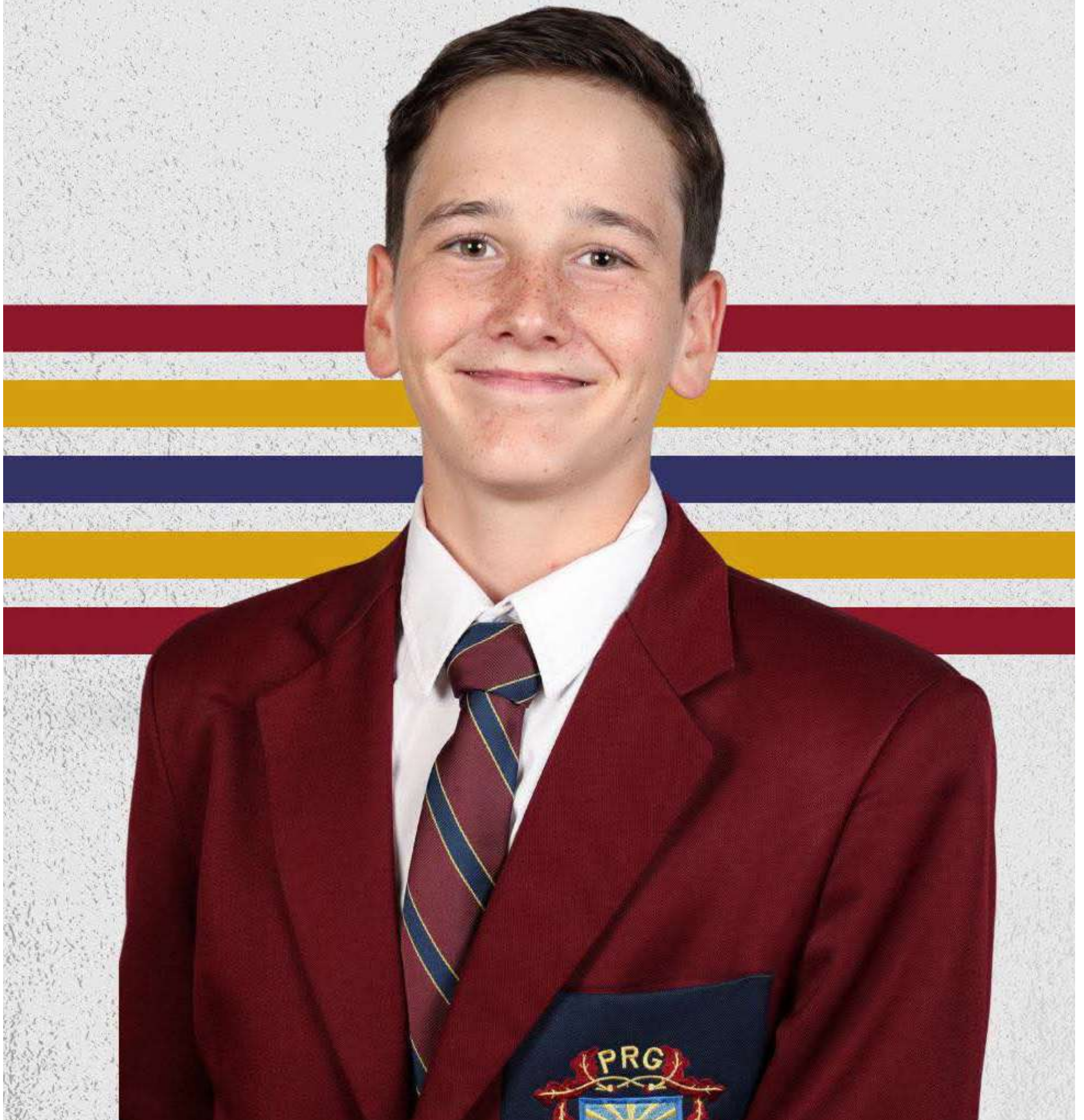

Criteria of Original Screenplays

In April 2025, Ryan Coogler's *Sinners* opened to sixty-one million dollars during its opening weekend against a ninety-million-dollar budget. By May, the film had grossed over \$200 million worldwide. By the end of the year, it had grossed \$370 million worldwide, making it one of the year's most commercially successful original films.

The New York Times headline read, "*Sinners* Is a Box Office Success*." Variety questioned whether the film would actually turn a profit. Ben Stiller and dozens of industry figures criticised the coverage for what it represented: a double standard upheld towards those who did not fit the criteria of making a film, specifically regarding those standing behind the camera. A comparison with the reception of other original screenplays reveals this clearly.

Marty Supreme, a Timothée Chalamet film directed by Josh Safdie,



opened in limited release on December 19 2025, earning eight hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars across six theatres. Once the film expanded to wide release, it earned twenty-seven million dollars during its opening weekend — less than half of *Sinners*' opening. Despite this, the coverage remained celebratory. The promotional campaign was described as "high-level genius," while the film itself was positioned as an event, a cultural moment, and a box office triumph for A24.

The film's success was undeniable, as anonymous executives questioned its profitability.

One Battle After Another, Paul

Thomas Anderson's original screenplay, opened with twenty-two million dollars against a one-hundred-and-seventy-five-million-dollar budget. It required significantly higher earnings than *Sinners* merely to break even, yet barely crossed two hundred million dollars globally. Nevertheless, coverage framed it as a prestige achievement — important cinema, and a film that mattered.

Again, no questioning its success.

Weapons, an original screenplay by Zach Cregger, opened with forty-three-point-five million dollars and was described as "one of the greatest box office stories of 2025." The film was immediately labelled a hit.

Hamnet, a book-to-film adaptation, opened in limited release and gradually found its audience. Critics praised the film, discussed it extensively, and positioned it as sophisticated cinema.

Sinners, however, were treated differently. Although the film outper-

formed all of these productions during its opening weekend, became a cultural phenomenon, and grossed more than three times what *One Battle After Another* earned globally, it was still questioned and undermined by the industry. A success with caveats.

The industry claims to celebrate original screenplays. It claims to value diverse voices and new stories. However, when an original screenplay emerges that does not match the established criteria, such as being a genre-fluid story rooted in Black folklore in the Mississippi Delta, refusing to conform to the expectation of racial suffering such as prestige, and embracing the spectacle and pleasure alongside substance, the industry attempts to contain it. The criteria, set by those in the voting room, establish success. Profitability is questioned using standards rarely applied to films that the industry approves of. Original films by established auteurs are celebrated, while those that challenge the industry's understanding of

what cinema should be are treated with suspicion.

Ryan Coogler's *Sinners* was not merely an original film that succeeded. It was an original film that succeeded in a way the industry neither expected nor knew how to categorise. By the time *Sinners* reached awards season, the industry no longer had the option of ignoring it. The film earned sixteen Oscar nominations — the highest number ever received by a single film in cinema history. Ryan Coogler won Best Original Screenplay, becoming the second man of colour to win in that category at the Oscars, and Michael B. Jordan won Best Actor. The film that had been treated as "a question" in April became an undeniable force by March.

The issue was in the suppression of original voices. Who should be celebrated as cultural events, and which would be questioned as anomalies. As has so often been the case, the answer depended on what was depicted on the screen.

What Brand of Chocolate Milk is the Best?

Did you know chocolate milk is generally considered a good recovery drink? This is because it provides carbohydrates, protein, fluids, and electrolytes all in one. After exercise, carbohydrates help replace lost energy, while protein supports muscle repair and growth. But now the question is: what brand of chocolate milk is the best?

On Friday, 30 January 2026, the English FAL class of Mr A. Uys did a chocolate milk tasting to settle the debate, which had been going on for some months.

This all began in 2025, when Mr Uys returned from the European

exchange programme and told our class about the chocolate milk that he and the rest of the students had bought in Europe, claiming it was the best he had ever tasted. The class did not agree with his statement due to the superiority of South African brands, such as Steri Stumpie.

So, Mr Uys made a deal with the class: during the December holidays he would return to Europe to buy some chocolate milk for the class to try, on the condition that they finish all their work.

During the last period on that Friday, the class tasted several chocolate milks and scored them on flavour, colour, and texture, each category rated out of 10. The final scores were added up out of 30,

and students also left a few notes. **Clover** was the least popular, with comments such as: "not sweet and needs more chocolate," "watered down," "too light in colour," and "a cheap option". Woolworths received comments like: "too thick," "too sweet," "too light in colour," "good protein," but "overpriced." **Steri Stumpie** had comments such as: "amazing in colour and flavour but a bit too runny." **Super M** received remarks like: "has an aftertaste that not many like," "good colour and flavour," "not too thick," but some felt it "could have a slightly sweeter taste". **Cécémel** received comments such as: "some say this is the best they have tasted," while others said it was "too thick" and "a bit too sweet."

When all was said and done, the

clear winner by far was Cécémel. The class was amazed to read the ingredients and notes, discovering that Cécémel had the fewest additives compared to the rest. So, if you are ever in Europe, search for this Cécémel chocolate milk brand and enjoy!



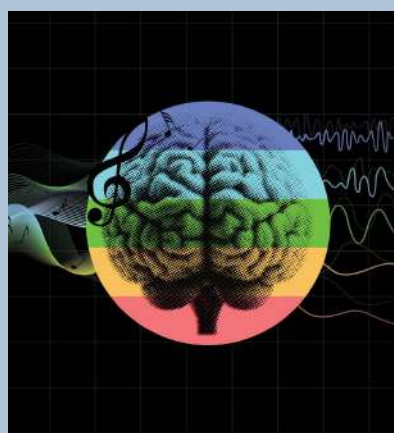
Frequency of the mind

Sounds and music... are they even important? Well as it turns out, frequencies can have an effect on your mental state and even your emotions.

A sudden change from high to low sounds can add to scary moments in movies, and the low vibrating roar of the Bomey can rev up the energy on the stands to 200%.

Now, you might argue: "No, it's the drums that hype up the



crowd." Well, those are still sounds, and all sounds are frequencies.

Believe it or not, sounds and frequencies can have a pro-

found effect on your emotions. Researchers at the Nofer Institute of Occupational Medicine have already tested the effects certain frequencies, such as the low drone produced by industrial machinery, can have on the human mind, with some very intriguing results.

By playing frequencies like those produced by heavy machinery and making the participants memorise information or perform simple tasks, they found that the frequencies had a very noticeable effect on the sensory components of the

body and also decreased reaction time. And whilst this might not seem like much, in big companies and industrial areas these effects can have a major impact on productivity and even lead to accidents.

This all happens because the human mind also works using frequencies. Therefore, by hearing certain frequencies, your brain is stimulated into a different state of thinking. Low frequencies, specifically those falling in the range of 0.5 - 13 Hz, promote things such as deep sleep and relaxation, whilst

higher frequencies instead promote alertness, perception and can sometimes even cause a feeling of uneasiness.

So, what does this mean? Well, when listening to music, go for higher-pitched sounds if you're looking to lock in and more lower-pitched music if you're only looking to chill. By utilizing your own brain's built-in frequencies, you can gain the state of mind that you are looking for.



Music's Mending of the Human Experience

There's something quite paradoxical about music: it is impossible to hold or to see, yet it leaves some of the deepest marks on human life. It drifts through cars, shopping centres, classrooms, and headphones — so naturally — that people hardly question its presence anymore. It's an invisible soundtrack that accompanies humans' everyday existence. Society's melody of life is constantly shaping emotion, memory, and identity, often far more deeply than humanity realises.

Researchers and educators have long pointed to music's cognitive value. Musical training has been linked to changes in the brain associated with learning, memory,



and coordination. This practice enhances the areas involved in hearing and higher-level thinking. Research also suggests that students who take part in music programmes tend to do better in areas such as language and mathematics. In other words, music doesn't just teach people how to play notes and rhythms — it can sharpen the mind in ways that go far beyond the classroom. Music should be a

tool that increases concentration, discipline and memory for young learners.

The psychological impact of the music may be even more profound. A song can wake up multiple areas of the brain at once, including those responsible for emotion, memory and reward. This helps explain why a familiar tune can bring back a forgotten moment in an instant or why a particular chorus can change the mood of a whole room. Music is also often an emotional shortcut, generating feelings that are difficult to put into words. It can soothe anxiety, elevate mood and help people process experiences that words can't easily express. Whether it is used in a classroom, on a train ride or during a difficult day,

music often works as a quiet companion to the mind.

Beyond thought and emotion, music also has clear therapeutic value. Songs are often used in medical and psychological contexts to promote healing, reduce stress and improve well-being. Its effects are not limited to entertainment; music can promote comfort in times of illness, bereavement or exhaustion and can offer a sense of grounding when life is uncertain. Moreover, music often helps people to understand themselves. Some songs become attached to particular memories, relationships or life stages, making personal histories audible. In that way, music is not only heard — it is lived.

Ultimately, the reason music is

needed is simple. It strengthens the brain, it speaks to emotions and memory, and it offers an identity to the sorrowful seasons of life. Music helps people make sense of being human. It is present in joy, in misery and in the ordinary moments in between. Music does not merely fill silence; it gives silence meaning...



Analogue in the Digital Age

In an era defined by speed, efficiency, and constant connectivity, creativity has become increasingly digital. Screens are where most ideas are typed, designs are made, and stories are built. While this shift has expanded creative possibilities, it has also flattened the creative process — making it faster but shallower. "Going analogue" is a response to this: a growing recognition of how deeply digital dependence has shaped daily life, and a deliberate effort to push back against it. Digital media has come to dominate modern culture, yet its coexistence with analogue methods reveals an inherent tension — though each serves distinct purposes, the rise of one often comes at the expense of the other. Many people are returning to journaling, sketching, and hand-drawing not out of a resistance to digital tools, but to sharpen them. In a world where digital production is the norm, analogue practices have become valuable tools for encouraging creativity, mindfulness, originality, and deeper thought.



One of the central problems with purely digital creativity is its emphasis on speed and polish. Digital platforms are built for efficiency — users can edit, refine, and duplicate ideas almost instantly. This increases productivity, but it can also discourage genuine exploration. Because mistakes are so easily corrected, creators may default to caution, prioritising clean results over raw experimentation. The risk is that creative work becomes formulaic and self-censored. Analogue practices, by contrast, introduce productive resistance. The permanence of pen on paper, or the unpredictability of a sketch, demands more deliberate thinking. Creators learn to treat imperfection not as an error to be fixed,

but as part of the process itself.

This return to analogue is not merely theoretical — it is increasingly visible in contemporary culture. In recent years, particularly among younger generations, there has been a pronounced resurgence of interest in analogue media, driven by digital fatigue and a desire to reconnect with the physical world. People are turning to analogue watches, collecting books and vinyl records, and making conscious efforts to reduce screen time. These shifts reflect a broader awareness of the costs of digital dependence and a desire to restore balance.

Analogue activities also offer something increasingly rare: uninterrupted focus. The relentless flow of notifications, social media, and information makes sustained attention difficult. Engaging with a journal or sketchbook removes these distractions, allowing the mind to slow down and think more carefully. This kind of focused awareness matters for creativity — it creates the conditions in which ideas can develop fully, and in which

connections emerge that a faster, more fragmented mode of working would miss.

The tactile dimension of analogue practice further enriches creative thinking. Digital tools tend to standardise the creative experience, whereas analogue methods engage multiple senses simultaneously. The physical act of writing or drawing forges a stronger mental connection to the work. This embodied engagement can generate more original ideas by encouraging creators to approach problems differently. The irregularities inherent in analogue work — an uneven line, a margin note — can spark unexpected insights that structured digital environments rarely produce.

The relationship between analogue and digital creativity is not one of opposition but of integration. The most effective creators draw on the strengths of both. Analogue methods are particularly valuable in the early stages of ideation, when openness and exploration matter most; digital tools can then refine and execute those ideas

with precision. This combined approach preserves the authenticity and depth of analogue creation while leveraging the speed and reach of digital platforms. Analogue does not replace digital innovation — it enriches it.

Ultimately, the revival of analogue practices in a digital age points to a fundamental truth about creativity: it does not thrive on convenience but on engagement. Digital tools offer unmatched capacity for production and distribution, but they cannot fully replicate the depth of thought and originality that arise from tactile, mindful creation. By incorporating analogue practices into their routines, individuals can move beyond the limitations of the screen and access a more grounded, authentic form of creative thinking. The future of creativity is not a choice between analogue and digital — it is the recognition that the most powerful ideas tend to emerge when the two work together.

Flow State: The Brain's Most Powerful Mode

You've felt it before. Time disappears, the noise around you fades, and whatever you're working on just clicks. You're not forcing it — it's flowing. That's not a coincidence or a stroke of luck. That's your brain operating at its absolute peak, and psychologists have a name for it.

The flow state was first described by psychologist Mihály Csíkszentmihályi in the 1970s — a state in which you're fully engaged in an activity, lose track of time, and feel a sense of effortless control. He called it an "optimal experience." But honestly, the science just puts a label on something humans have

been chasing forever. Artists, athletes, writers, monks — people across cultures and centuries have stumbled into this state and built their lives around getting back to it.

What makes flow so fascinating is that it isn't just about getting things done faster. It's a mental state where you're directing every ounce of attention toward one thing, with almost no thoughts about yourself or how you're performing. That inner critic goes quiet. The self-consciousness lifts. And what's left is just you and the work, in a kind of rare, effortless harmony that most people only experience a handful of times before they start wondering how to get there on purpose.

And the benefits go way deeper

than productivity. A large 2024 study found that people who regularly experience flow are significantly less likely to be diagnosed with depression, anxiety, or stress-related disorders. Neuroscience research backs this up too — flow activates the brain's reward



system while quieting the regions tied to self-criticism and rumination. In other words, it doesn't just make you better at your work. It makes you feel better about being alive.

So how do you actually get there? The honest answer is that it's less about hacking your brain and more about setting the stage. Flow tends to show up when the challenge in front of you is just a little beyond your comfort zone — hard enough to demand your full attention, but not so overwhelming that you freeze. You also need a clear sense of what you're trying to accomplish. Vague intentions scatter focus; a specific target gives your mind something to grip. And perhaps most importantly, you need

to protect your environment. Flow takes time to build and almost no time to destroy — a notification, a conversation, a wandering thought can pull you right out of it.

One underrated trick is building a small ritual before you work — tidying your desk, putting on a specific playlist, writing down one clear intention. Done consistently, it becomes a signal to your brain that deep focus is coming. Over time, that cue alone can make flow easier to access.

The real shift happens when you stop thinking of flow as something that happens to you and start treating it as something you can build toward. It won't show up every day. But the more you understand it, the more often it will.

Seventy Summers of Shakespeare: Twelfth Night at Maynardville

On a warm February evening, Paul Roos students had the opportunity to experience one of Cape Town's cultural landmarks. Tucked away in Wynberg, the Maynardville Open-Air Theatre sits quietly beneath the trees, almost hidden from the rush of the city. Yet beyond the stage where Twelfth Night came to life lies a rich and enduring legacy of performances that spans generations, making this year's production part of a tradition far larger than the moment itself.

The earliest performances at Maynardville did not begin with Shakespeare, but with ballet. Around six years before the first Shakespeare production, the space was already being used for open-air music and dance performances on a simple

stretch of grass where the stage now stands. These early productions were modest in scale, yet they established the foundations of what would become a lasting cultural tradition in Cape Town.

Following the success of these ballet seasons, Margaret Molteno, who had played a key role in the staging of the early performances, proposed the idea of introducing Shakespeare to the venue. She brought the suggestion to Cecilia Sonnenberg and René Ahrenson of the Spotlight Theatre Company, who recognised its potential. Together, they reached out to Leslie French of London's Regent's Park Open Air Theatre for guidance in shaping the first Shakespeare production at Maynardville.

The earliest Shakespeare performances were largely amateur in na-

ture, with Sonnenberg and Ahrenson often performing alongside other unpaid but dedicated actors. Despite their humble beginnings, the productions quickly gained popularity and attracted growing public support. By the 1970s, the Cape Performing Arts Board (CAPAB) began providing financial assistance, and by 1980, it had assumed full responsibility for the productions, helping to secure Maynardville's place as a permanent fixture in Cape Town's cultural landscape.

For the 70th annual performance, Director Steven Stead certainly did not disappoint. Maynardville's 2026 production of Twelfth Night manages to seamlessly combine the humour and wit of Shakespeare's original text with a refreshingly modern setting. From a sultry jazz soundtrack to comedic subplots,

this production has something to interest everyone. The music was certainly a highlight, as were the excellent performances of the actors. Characters such as Malvolio, Feste, and Sir Toby Belch particularly stood out in the minds of audiences. 2026's Twelfth Night was undoubtedly one of the most magnificent and memorable Shakespeare productions that the theatre has done in

recent memory.

What makes Maynardville remarkable is not only its history, but its consistency. Year after year, it returns with the same quiet assurance, offering audiences something both familiar and new. 410 years after the death of the Bard himself, William Shakespeare, Maynardville continues to keep his legacy alive.

By die hoogspring het atlete hul liggame oor die lat gebuig en by die spiesgooi het die spies soos 'n pyl deur die warm lug gesny.

PRG-oudleerders Skryf ’n Wêreld Oop

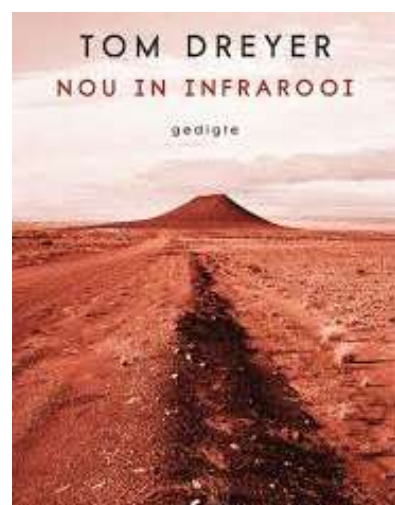

Drama maak sy debuut by PRG

Aan die begin van die eerste kwartaal is Drama amptelik as 'n nuwe vak by die skool geregistreer; tans slegs aangebied as 'n ekstra vak vir graad 10-leerlinge, maar reeds beskou as die fondasie van 'n toekomstige florerende departement. Tog is die ontstaan daarvan nie so eenvoudig of spontaan soos dit dalk voorkom nie en die storie begin lank voor die eerste les aangebied is.

Die instelling van Drama by die skool was alles behalwe 'n oornagbesluit. Vir meer as 'n jaar het die huidige graad 11-groep gesoebat met die hoop dat die vak deel van die skool se aanbod sou word. Baie van hierdie versoeke het uiteindelik voor die deur van juffrou Björn Walters beland. Hoewel haar liefde vir die skeppende kunste duidelik is, was sy nie formeel gekwalifiseer om die vak self aan te bied nie.

Dit was toe dat ons eie dr. Stephan

Bezuidenhout ingetree het, met Juffrou Walters aan sy sy, om vir die instelling van Drama te pleit. Gedurende die proses is daar egter 'n struikelblok ontdek: enige nuwe vak wat geregistreer word, moet vanaf graad 10 aangebied word. Hoewel dit teleurstellend was vir die graad 11's wat vir só lank daarvoor gepleit het, het die visie nie daar geëindig nie. Daar is besluit om die vak tog in te stel vir toekomstige geslagte wie se passie vir dra-

ma net so sterk brand. Hiervoor was minstens vyf graad 10-leerders nodig om, vir die eerste keer in die skool se 160-jarige geskiedenis, die grondslag van Drama as vak te lê.

Die soektog na daardie eerste vyf leerders het dus begin. Met die hulp van juffrou Wiemahn, asook die belofte dat lesse tydens saalperiodes sou plaasvind, het die stigtersvaders besluit om hulself toe te wy aan die vak. Die heel eerste les het, redelik

ironies, afgeskop terwyl die 100 m-resies op interhuis-atletiekdag aan die gang was. Daarna is lesse voortgesit in elke beskikbare saalperiode waarmee die nuwe departement kon wegkom. Later het nog drie leerders by die oorspronklike groep aangesluit. Vir sommiges was dit aanloklik om tydelik van haarinspeksies te ontsnap, terwyl ander die vak as "maklike punte" beskou het. Wat ook al die rede was, die resultaat is 'n unieke mengselmoes

van talent, passie en ... karakter.

Juffrou Walters beklemtoon egter dat Drama nie bloot as 'n toevlug of maklike uitweg beskou moet word nie. "Leerders wat nie passie vir die skeppende kunste het of bereid is om moeite met hul werk te doen nie, is glad nie welkom nie," sê sy. Die departement staan vas by die idee dat Drama 'n ernstige akademiese vak is en nie bloot deel vorm van die sogenaamde "pret pakket" nie.

Wat vandag nog uit 'n klein groepie toegewyde leerders bestaan, kan eendag ontwikkel tot een van die skool se trotsste departemente. Drama se ontstaan was nie toevallig of spontaan nie, maar die resultaat van volgehoue passie, deursettingsvermoë en mense wat bereid was om vir 'n idee te veg. Vir nou word die verhoogligte nog net op 'n handjievol graad 10's gerig, maar soos enige goeie produksie, begin die grootste stories dikwels met 'n subtiële uiteensetting.
